GOSPEL REFLECTION: Today's Gospel reading is taken from the Gospel of John. We are reading much further into John's Gospel than we have for the past two weeks. Chapter 12 of John's Gospel is a preparation for the beginning of the passion narrative to follow. Jesus has just raised Lazarus from the dead - an important sign in John's Gospel, which inspired many people to believe in Jesus. This event also marks the turning point in Jesus' conflict with the Jewish authorities. John's Gospel tells us that the Sanhedrin met after this event and made plans to kill Jesus. In the 12th chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus is anointed at Bethany and enters Jerusalem in triumph. We again see evidence of the significance of the raising of Lazarus to this event; John reports that the crowds also gathered to see Lazarus.

Following his triumphant entry into Jerusalem, Jesus predicted his suffering, death, and Resurrection and prepared his disciples to believe in the salvation that his death would accomplish. Using the metaphor of the grain of wheat, Jesus presented the idea that his dying would be beneficial. He also taught that those who would be his disciples must follow his example of sacrifice. This theme will be repeated in John's account of the Last Supper, when Jesus washed the feet of his disciples as an example of how they must serve one another.

The final section of today's Gospel might be read as John's parallel to the agony in the garden. Unlike the Synoptic Gospels, the Gospel of John does not record Jesus' anguished prayer in the garden of Gethsemane before his arrest. Although comparable words are found in today's reading, Jesus gives a confident response to the question he raises when asking God to save him from his impending death. After announcing his conviction that it is for this purpose that he came, a voice from heaven speaks, as if in answer to Jesus' prayer. This voice, like the one heard at Jesus' baptism and at Jesus' Transfiguration - events reported in the Synoptic Gospels but not in John's Gospel - affirms that God welcomes the sacrifice that Jesus will make on behalf of others. In John's Gospel, Jesus teaches that this voice was sent for the sake of those who would believe in him.

In today's Gospel, we also hear Jesus speak about the cosmic framework against which we are to understand his passion, death, and Resurrection. Through his death and Resurrection, Jesus conquered Satan, the ruler of this world. In this way the world is judged, but the judgement is not condemnation. Instead, through Jesus' dying and rising, salvation is brought to the world.

PARISH NEWS

PALM SUNDAY: This takes place on Sunday 24th March 2024. We are going back to the tradition of the Mass and will congregate outside church, prior to the start of 10.30 a.m. Mass, and will process in after the blessing of the palms. Obviously, those who are unable to congregate outside please just go into church as normal and we will join you.

THE EASTER TRIDUUM-28th **to 30**th **MARCH:** Sundown on Holy Thursday to sundown on Easter Sunday is the three-day period known as the Easter Triduum. It is one, great, single festival recounting the last days of Jesus' life. Holy Thursday, at the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, (St Mary's 7p.m.) is where we live the institution of the Eucharist and the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, and the institution of the priesthood, which took place the evening before Jesus was crucified. During this Mass there is the "washing of the feet" (we are looking for 12 volunteers, sign-up sheet at the back of church) ceremony, where the priest, imitating Jesus, washes the feet of others to signify his role as servant. Mass concludes with a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the "altar of repose," a place where the consecrated Host is kept, away from the main altar, where Mass is normally celebrated.

Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence. This is the day of the crucifixion. The altar is plain and bare. There is no consecrated Host in the tabernacle; it was carried away on Holy Thursday night to the "altar of repose" to signify Jesus' death. The tabernacle doors are left open to show that it is empty. Jesus is gone. Good Friday is the only day of the year on which no Masses are offered. Instead, we listen to the story of the crucifixion and venerate the cross. On this day there will be stations of the cross at St Patrick's at 11 a.m. and the passion service will be at St Mary's at 3 p.m..

After nightfall on Holy Saturday we celebrate the Easter Vigil, rejoicing in the resurrection of Jesus. It is the most glorious, beautiful, and important celebration for the Church.

To experience Easter in its fullness, is to experience the whole of the Triduum, I strongly encourage everyone to attend all three parts of the Triduum.

GOOD SHEPHERD CHURCH: Following last week's Fabric and Finance and this week's Parish Council meetings the following was proposed and agreed in principle by members. Of course, I am not fully aware of the history of certain items at all three churches and therefore I would encourage anyone who has information, which would make the proposal unworkable, to contact Fr Darren.

The proposal is that the statues from Good Shepherd will be relocated to St Mary's. The St Anthony statue from St Mary's will be moved to St Patrick's. The stations of the cross from the Good Shepherd will be relocated into St Patrick's church. St Patrick's stations will be moved to St Patrick's school. Five rows of benches (two per row, one either side of church) will be relocated to St Patrick's church. These rows would take the bench area to the part where the floor changes from carpet to wood type flooring. The rest of the benches will either be relocated to another church or chapel, if no one is interested in taking the benches they will be sold. Going forward the wood floor area would still be used for small social gathering. It is also proposed that we offer the altar and tabernacle to another parish or school. The sacristy press will be relocated to St Patrick's.
